Note on orbifold Chow ring of semi-projective toric Deligne –Mumford stacks

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We prove a formula for the orbifold Chow ring of semi-projective toric Deligne–Mumford (DM) stacks, generalizing the orbifold Chow ring formula of projective toric DM stacks by Borisov–Chen– Smith. We also consider a special kind of semi-projective toric DM stacks, the Lawrence toric DM stacks. We prove that the orbifold Chow ring of a Lawrence toric DM stack is isomorphic to the orbifold Chow ring of its associated hypertoric DM stack studied in Y. Jiang and H.-H. Tseng, The orbifold Chow ring of hypertoric Deligne–Mumford stacks, J. Reine Angew. Math. (Crelle's Journal), to appear, math.AG/0512199.

1. Introduction

The main aim of this paper is to generalize the orbifold Chow ring formula of Borisov–Chen–Smith for projective toric Deligne–Mumford (DM) stacks to the case of semi-projective toric DM stacks.

In the paper [3], Borisov, Chen and Smith developed the theory of toric DM stacks using stacky fans, generalizing the quotient construction of simplicial toric varieties, [7, 8]. A stacky fan is a triple $\Sigma = (N, \Sigma, \beta)$, where N is a finitely generated abelian group, Σ is a simplicial fan in the lattice $\overline{N} := N/\text{torsion}$ and $\beta : \mathbb{Z}^n \to N$ is a map given by a collection of vectors $\{b_1,\ldots,b_n\} \subset N$ such that the images $\{\bar{b}_1,\ldots,\bar{b}_n\}$ generate the fan Σ . A toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is defined using Σ ; it is a quotient stack whose coarse moduli space is the toric variety $X(\Sigma)$ corresponding to the simplicial fan Σ .

The construction of toric DM stacks was slightly generalized later in [12], in which the notion of extended stacky fans was introduced. This new notion is based on that of stacky fans plus some extra data. Extended stacky fans yield toric DM stacks in the same way as stacky fans do. The main point is that extended stacky fans provide presentations of toric DM stacks not available from stacky fans.

When $X(\Sigma)$ is projective, it is found in [3] that the orbifold Chow ring (or Chen–Ruan cohomology ring) of $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ introduced in [1, 5] is isomorphic to a deformed ring of the group ring of N. We call a toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ semi-projective if its coarse moduli space $X(\Sigma)$ is semi-projective. Hausel and Sturmfels [10] computed the Chow ring of semi-projective toric varieties. Their answer is also known as the "Stanley–Reisner" ring of a fan, also see [14, 15]. Using their result, we prove a formula of the orbifold Chow ring of semi-projective toric DM stacks.

Consider an extended stacky fan $\Sigma = (N, \Sigma, \beta)$, where Σ is the simplicial fan of the semi-projective toric variety $X(\Sigma)$. Let N_{tor} be the torsion subgroup of N, then $N = \overline{N} \oplus N_{\text{tor}}$. Let $N_{\Sigma} := |\Sigma| \oplus N_{\text{tor}}$. Note that $|\Sigma|$ is convex, and so $|\Sigma| \oplus N_{tor}$ is a subgroup of N. Define the deformed ring $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}] := \bigoplus_{c \in N_{\Sigma}} \mathbb{Q}y^c$ with the product structure given by

(1.1)
\n
$$
y^{c_1} \cdot y^{c_2} := \begin{cases} y^{c_1+c_2} & \text{if there is a cone } \sigma \in \Sigma \text{ such that } \overline{c}_1 \in \sigma, \overline{c}_2 \in \sigma; \\ 0 & \text{otherwise.} \end{cases}
$$

Note that if $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is projective, then $N_{\Sigma} = N$ and $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}]$ is the deformed ring $\mathbb{Q}[N]^{\Sigma}$ in [3]. Let $A^*_{\text{orb}}(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma))$ denote the orbifold Chow ring of the toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$.

Theorem 1.1. Assume that $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is semi-projective. There is an isomorphism of rings

$$
A_{\mathrm{orb}}^*(\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma})) \cong \frac{\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}]}{\{\sum_{i=1}^n e(b_i)y^{b_i} : e \in N^{\star}\}}.
$$

The strategy of proving Theorem 1.1 is as follows. We use a formula in [10] for the ordinary Chow ring of semi-projective toric varieties. We prove that each twisted sector is also a semi-projective toric DM stack. With this, we use a method similar to that in [3, 12] to prove the isomorphism as modules. The argument to show the isomorphism as rings is the same as that in [3], except that we only take elements in the support of the fan.

An interesting class of examples of semi-projective toric DM stack is the Lawrence toric DM stacks. We discuss the properties of such stacks. We study the 3-twisted sectors or twisted sectors of Lawrence toric DM stacks, which allows us to draw connections to hypertoric DM stacks studied in [13]. We prove that the orbifold Chow ring of a Lawrence toric DM stack is isomorphic to the orbifold Chow ring of its associated hypertoric DM stack. This is an analog of Theorem 1.1 in [10] for orbifold Chow rings.

The rest of this text is organized as follows. In Section 2, we define semiprojective toric DM stacks and prove Theorem 1.1. Results on Lawrence toric DM stacks are discussed in Section 3.

Conventions. In this paper we work entirely algebraically over the field of complex numbers. Chow rings and orbifold Chow rings are taken with rational coefficients. By an orbifold we mean a smooth DM stack with trivial generic stabilizer.

For a simplicial fan Σ , we use $|\Sigma|$ to represent the lattice points in Σ . Note that if Σ is convex, Σ is a free abelian subgroup of N. We write N^* for $\text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(N,\mathbb{Z})$ and $N \to \overline{N}$ the natural map of modding out torsions. We refer to [3] for the construction of the Gale dual $\beta^{\vee} : \mathbb{Z}^m \to DG(\beta)$ of $\beta: \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$.

2. Semi-projective toric DM stacks and their orbifold chow rings

In this section, we define semi-projective toric DM stacks and discuss their properties.

2.1. Semi-projective toric DM stacks

Definition 2.1 [10]. A toric variety X is called semi-projevtive if the natural map

$$
\pi: X \to X_0 = \operatorname{Spec}(H^0(X, \mathcal{O}_X)),
$$

is projective and X has at least one torus-fixed point.

Definition 2.2 [12]. An extended stacky fan Σ is a triple (N, Σ, β) , where N is a finitely generated abelian group, Σ is a simplicial fan in $N_{\mathbb{R}}$ and $\beta : \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$ is the map determined by the elements $\{b_1, \ldots, b_m\}$ in N such that ${\{\overline{b}_1,\ldots,\overline{b}_n\}}$ generate the simplicial fan Σ (here $m \geq n$).

Given an extended stacky fan $\Sigma = (N, \Sigma, \beta)$, we have the following exact sequences:

(2.1)
$$
0 \longrightarrow DG(\beta)^{\star} \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z}^{m} \stackrel{\beta}{\longrightarrow} N \longrightarrow Coker(\beta) \longrightarrow 0,
$$

(2.2)
$$
0 \longrightarrow N^* \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z}^m \stackrel{\beta^{\vee}}{\longrightarrow} \text{DG}(\beta) \longrightarrow \text{Coker}(\beta^{\vee}) \longrightarrow 0,
$$

where β^{\vee} is the Gale dual of β (see [3]). Applying $\text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(-,\mathbb{C}^*)$ to (2.2) yields

(2.3)
$$
1 \longrightarrow \mu \longrightarrow G \stackrel{\alpha}{\longrightarrow} (\mathbb{C}^*)^m \longrightarrow (\mathbb{C}^*)^d \longrightarrow 1.
$$

The toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is the quotient stack $[Z/G]$, where $Z := (\mathbb{C}^n \setminus \Sigma)$ $V(J_{\Sigma})) \times (\mathbb{C}^*)^{m-n}$, J_{Σ} is the irrelevant ideal of the fan Σ and G acts on Z through the map α in (2.3). The coarse moduli space of $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is the simplicial toric variety $X(\Sigma)$ corresponding to the simplicial fan Σ ; see [3, 12].

Definition 2.3. A toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is *semi-projective* if the coarse moduli space $X(\Sigma)$ is semi-projective.

Theorem 2.4. The following notions are equivalent:

- (1) A semi-projective toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$;
- (2) A toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ such that the simplicial fan Σ is a regular triangulation of $\mathcal{B} = {\overline{b}_1, \ldots, \overline{b}_n}$ which spans the lattice \overline{N} .

Proof. Since the toric DM stack is semi-projective if its coarse moduli space is semi-projective, the theorem follows from results in [10]. \Box

2.2. The inertia stack

Let Σ be an extended stacky fan and $\sigma \in \Sigma$ a cone. Define $\text{link}(\sigma) :=$ $\{\tau : \sigma + \tau \in \Sigma, \sigma \cap \tau = 0\}$. Let $\{\tilde{\rho}_1, \ldots, \tilde{\rho}_l\}$ be the rays in $link(\sigma)$. Consider the quotient extended stacky fan $\Sigma/\sigma = (N(\sigma), \Sigma/\sigma, \beta(\sigma))$, with $\beta(\sigma)$: $\mathbb{Z}^{l+m-n} \to N(\sigma)$ given by the images of b_1,\ldots,b_l and b_{n+1},\ldots,b_m under $N \to N(\sigma)$. By the construction of toric DM stacks, if σ is contained in a top-dimensional cone in Σ , we have $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma) := [Z(\sigma)/G(\sigma)],$ where $Z(\sigma)=(\mathbb{A}^l \setminus \mathbb{V}(J_{\Sigma/\sigma})) \times (\mathbb{C}^*)^{m-n}$ and $G(\sigma)=\text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(DG(\beta(\sigma)),\mathbb{C}^*).$

Lemma 2.5. If $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is semi-projective, so is $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma)$.

Proof. Semi-projectivity of the stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ means the simplicial fan Σ is a fan coming from a regular triangulation of $\mathcal{B} = \{\bar{b}_1, \ldots, \bar{b}_n\}$ which spans the lattice \overline{N} . Let pos(\mathcal{B}) be the convex polyhedral cone generated by \mathcal{B} . Then from [10], the triangulation is supported on $pos(\mathcal{B})$ and is determined by a simple polyhedron whose normal fan is Σ . So σ is contained in a top-dimensional cone τ in Σ . The image $\tilde{\tau}$ of τ under quotient by σ is a top-dimensional cone in the quotient fan Σ/σ . So the toric variety $X(\Sigma/\sigma)$

is semi-projective by Theorem 2.4, and the stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma)$ is semi-projective by definition. \Box

Recall in [3] that for each top-dimensional cone σ in Σ , define $Box(\sigma)$ to be the set of elements $v \in N$ such that $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} a_i b_i$ for some $0 \le a_i < 1$. Elements in $Box(\sigma)$ are in one-to-one correspondence with elements in the finite group $N(\sigma) = N/N_{\sigma}$, where $N(\sigma)$ is a local group of the stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$. In fact, we write $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v})} a_i b_i$ for some $0 < a_i < 1$, where $\sigma(\overline{v})$ is the minimal cone containing \overline{v} . We denote by $Box(\Sigma)$ the union of $Box(\sigma)$ for all top-dimensional cones σ .

Proposition 2.6. The r-inertia stack is given by

(2.4)
$$
\mathcal{I}_r(\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma})) = \coprod_{(v_1,\ldots,v_r)\in Box(\mathbf{\Sigma})^r} \mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\ldots,\overline{v}_r)),
$$

where $\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\ldots,\overline{v}_r)$ is the minimal cone in Σ containing $\overline{v}_1,\ldots,\overline{v}_r$.

Proof. Since G is an abelian group, we have

$$
\mathcal{I}_r(\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma})) = \left[\left(\prod_{(v_1,\ldots,v_r) \in (G)^r} Z^{(v_1,\ldots,v_r)} \right) / G \right],
$$

where $Z^{(v_1,...,v_r)} \subset Z$ is the subvariety fixed by v_1,\ldots,v_r . Since $\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\ldots,\overline{v}_r)$ is contained in a top-dimensional cone in Σ . We use the same method as in Lemma 4.6 and Proposition 4.7 of [3] to prove that $[Z^{(v_1,...,v_r)}/G] \cong$ $\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\ldots,\overline{v}_r)).$

Note that in (2.4) each component is semi-projective.

2.3. The orbifold Chow ring

In this section, we compute the orbifold Chow ring of semi-projective toric DM stacks and prove Theorem 1.1.

The module structure. Let $\Sigma = (N, \Sigma, \beta)$ be an extended stacky fan such that the toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is semi-projective. Since the fan Σ is convex, $|\Sigma|$ is an abelian subgroup of N. We put $N_{\Sigma} := |\Sigma| \oplus N_{\text{tor}}$, where N_{tor} is the torsion subgroup of N. Define the deformed ring $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}] := \bigoplus_{c \in N_{\Sigma}} \mathbb{Q}y^c$ with the product structure given by (1.1) .

Let $\{\rho_1,\ldots,\rho_n\}$ be the rays of Σ , then each ρ_i corresponds to a line bundle L_i over the toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ given by the trivial line bundle $\mathbb{C} \times Z$ over Z with the G action on \mathbb{C} given by the *i*th component α_i of $\alpha: G \to (\mathbb{C}^*)^m$ in (2.3). The first Chern classes of the line bundles L_i , which we identify with y^{b_i} , generate the cohomology ring of the simplicial toric variety $X(\Sigma)$.

Let S_{Σ} be the quotient ring $\mathbb{Q}[y^{b_1}, \ldots, y^{b_n}]/I_{\Sigma}$, where I_{Σ} is the squarefree ideal of the fan Σ generated by the monomials

 $\{y^{b_{i_1}} \cdots y^{b_{i_k}} : \overline{b}_{i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{i_k} \}$ do not generate a cone in $\Sigma \}$.

It is clear that S_{Σ} is a subring of the deformed ring $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}].$

Lemma 2.7. Let $A^*(X(\Sigma))$ be the ordinary Chow ring of a semi-projective toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$. Then there is a ring isomorphism:

$$
A^*(\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma})) \cong \frac{S_{\mathbf{\Sigma}}}{\left\{\sum_{i=1}^n e(b_i)y^{b_i} : e \in N^{\star}\right\}}.
$$

Proof. The lemma is easily proven from the fact that the Chow ring of a DM stack is isomorphic to the Chow ring of its coarse moduli space [17]; $[10,$ Proposition 2.11]. \Box

Now we study the module structure on $A^*_{\text{orb}}(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma))$. Because Σ is a simplicial fan, we have:

Lemma 2.8. For any $c \in N_{\Sigma}$, let σ be the minimal cone in Σ containing *c*. Then there is a unique expression $c = v + \sum_{\rho_i \subset \sigma} m_i b_i$, where $m_i \in \mathbb{Z}_{\geq 0}$ and $v \in Box(\sigma)$.

Proposition 2.9. Let $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ be a semi-projective toric DM stack associated to an extended stacky fan Σ . We have an isomorphism of $A^*(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma))$ modules:

$$
\bigoplus_{v \in \text{Box}(\Sigma)} A^*(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v})))[\deg(y^v)] \cong \frac{\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}]}{\{\sum_{i=1}^n e(b_i)y^{b_i} : e \in N^{\star}\}}.
$$

 $\bigoplus_{v\in\text{Box}(\Sigma)} y^v \cdot S_{\Sigma}$. The rest is similar to the proof of [12, Proposition 4.7], *Proof.* From the definition of $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}]$ and Lemma 2.8, we see that $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma}] =$ we leave it to the readers. \Box

The Chen–Ruan product structure. The orbifold cup product on a DM stack X is defined using genus 0, degree 0, 3-pointed orbifold Gromov– Witten invariants on \mathcal{X} . The relevant moduli space is the disjoint union of

all 3-twisted sectors (i.e., the double inertia stack). By (2.4), the 3-twisted sectors of a semi-projective toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ are

(2.5)
$$
\coprod_{(v_1,v_2,v_3)\in \text{Box}(\mathbf{\Sigma})^3, v_1v_2v_3=1} \mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)).
$$

Let $ev_i : \mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)) \to \mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_i))$ be the evaluation maps. The obstruction bundle (see [5, 6]) $Ob_{(v_1,v_2,v_3)}$ over the 3-twisted sector $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3))$ are defined by

(2.6)
$$
\mathrm{Ob}_{(v_1,v_2,v_3)} := (e^*T(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)) \otimes H^1(C,\mathcal{O}_C))^H,
$$

where $e: \mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)) \to \mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ is the embedding, $C \to \mathbb{P}^1$ is the H-covering branched over three marked points $\{0, 1, \infty\} \subset \mathbb{P}^1$, and H is the group generated by v_1, v_2, v_3 .

A general result in [4, 11] about the obstruction bundle implies the following.

Proposition 2.10. Let $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3))$ be a 3-twisted sector of the stack $\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma})$. Suppose $v_1 + v_2 + v_3 = \sum_{\rho_i \subset \sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)} a_i b_i$, $a_i = 1$ or 2. Then the Euler class of the obstruction bundle $Ob_{(v_1,v_2,v_3)}$ on $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3))$ is

$$
\prod_{a_i=2}c_1(L_i)|_{\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}/\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3))},
$$

where L_i is the line bundle over $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma)$ corresponding to the ray ρ_i .

Let $v \in Box(\Sigma)$, say $v \in N(\sigma)$, for some top-dimensional cone σ . Let $\check{v} \in$ $Box(\Sigma)$ be the inverse of v as an element in the group $N(\sigma)$. Equivalently, if $v = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v})} \alpha_i b_i$ for $0 < \alpha_i < 1$, then $\check{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v})} (1 - \alpha_i) b_i$. Then for $\alpha_1, \alpha_2 \in \overline{A_{\rm orb}^*}(\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}))$, the orbifold cup product is defined by

(2.7) $\alpha_1 \cup_{\text{orb}} \alpha_2 = \hat{\text{ev}}_{3*}(\text{ev}_1^*\alpha_1 \cup \text{ev}_2^*\alpha_2 \cup e(\text{Ob}_{(v_1, v_2, v_3)})),$

where $\hat{\text{ev}}_3 = I \circ \text{ev}_3$, and $I: \mathcal{I}X(\Sigma) \to \mathcal{I}X(\Sigma)$ is the natural map given by $(x, g) \mapsto (x, g^{-1}).$

Proof of Theorem 1.1. By Proposition 2.9, it remains to consider the cup product. In this case, for any $v_1, v_2 \in \text{Box}(\Sigma)$, we also have

$$
v_1 + v_2 = \check{v}_3 + \sum_{a_i=2} b_i + \sum_{i \in J} b_i,
$$

where J represents the set of j such that ρ_i belongs to $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2)$, but not belong to $\sigma(\overline{v}_3)$. Then the proof is the same as the proof in [3]. We omit the details.

3. Lawrence toric DM stacks

In this section, we study a special type of semi-projective toric DM stacks called the Lawrence toric DM stacks. Their orbifold Chow rings are shown to be isomorphic to the orbifold Chow rings of their associated hypertoric DM stacks studied in [13].

3.1. Stacky hyperplane arrangements

Let $N, \{b_1, \ldots, b_m\} \in N, \beta : \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$, and $\{\overline{b}_1, \ldots, \overline{b}_m\} \subset \overline{N}$ be as in Definition 2.2. We assume that $\{b_1,\ldots,b_m\} \in N$ are nontorsion integral vectors. We still have the exact sequences (2.1) and (2.2). The Gale dual map β^{\vee} of β is given by a collection of integral vectors $\beta^{\vee} = (a_1, \ldots, a_m)$. Choose a generic element $\theta \in DG(\beta)$ and let $\psi := (r_1, \ldots, r_m)$ be a lifting of θ in \mathbb{Z}^m such that $\theta = -\beta^{\vee}\psi$. Note that θ is generic if and only if it is not in any hyperplane of the configuration determined by β^{\vee} in DG(β)_R. Associated to θ there is a hyperplane arrangement $\mathcal{H} = \{H_1, \ldots, H_m\}$ defined as follows: let H_i be the hyperplane

(3.1)
$$
H_i := \{ v \in M_{\mathbb{R}} | < \bar{b}_i, v > +r_i = 0 \} \subset M_{\mathbb{R}}.
$$

This determines hyperplane arrangement in $M_{\mathbb{R}}$, up to translation. It is well known that hyperplane arrangements determine the topology of hypertoric varieties [2]. We call $A := (N, \beta, \theta)$ a stacky hyperplane arrangement.

The toric variety $X(\Sigma)$ is defined by the weighted polytope $\mathbf{\Gamma} := \bigcap_{i=1}^m F_i$, where $F_i = \{v \in M_{\mathbb{R}} \mid v \geq t_i, v > +r_i \geq 0\}$. Suppose that **Γ** is bounded, the fan Σ is the normal fan of **Γ** in $M_{\mathbb{R}} = \mathbb{R}^d$ with one dimensional rays generated by b_1,\ldots,b_n . By reordering, we may assume that H_1,\ldots,H_n are the hyperplanes that bound the polytope **Γ**, and $H_{n+1},...,H_m$ are the other hyperplanes. Then we have an extended stacky fan $\Sigma = (N, \Sigma, \beta)$ as in Definition 2.2, with Σ the normal fan of **Γ**, β : $\mathbb{Z}^m \to N$ given by ${b_1,\ldots,b_n,b_{n+1},\ldots,b_m\} \subset N$, and ${b_{n+1},\ldots,b_m\}$ the extra data. We define the hypertoric DM stack $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A})$ using this \mathcal{A} ; see [13] for more details.

3.2. Lawrence toric DM stacks

Applying Gale dual to the map

(3.2)

\mathbb{Z}^m \oplus \mathbb{Z}^m \to \mathrm{DG}(\beta),
$$

given by $(\beta^{\vee}, -\beta^{\vee})$, we obtain

$$
\beta_{\mathcal{L}}:\mathbb{Z}^m\oplus\mathbb{Z}^m\longrightarrow N_{\mathcal{L}},
$$

which is given by integral vectors $\{b_{L,1},\ldots,b_{L,m},b'_{L,1},\ldots,b'_{L,m}\}\$ in N_L . The ${\rm natural\ images\ } \{\bar{b}_{\text{L},1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{\text{L},m},\bar{b}'_{\text{L},1},\ldots,\bar{b}'_{\text{L},m}\} \subset \overline{N}_\text{L} \text{ are called the Lawrence}}$ lifting of $\{\bar{b}_1,\ldots,\bar{b}_m\} \subset \overline{N}$.

Associated to the generic element θ , let $\overline{\theta}$ be the natural image under the map $DG(\beta) \to \overline{DG(\beta)}$. Then the map $\overline{\beta}^{\vee}$: $\mathbb{Z}^m \to \overline{DG(\beta)}$ is given by $\overline{\beta}^{\vee} = (\overline{a}_1, \ldots, \overline{a}_m)$. For any column basis of the form $C = {\overline{a}_{i_1}, \ldots, \overline{a}_{i_{m-d}}}$, there exist unique $\lambda_1, \ldots, \lambda_{m-d}$ such that

a_{i_1}\lambda_1 + \cdots + a_{i_{m-d}}\lambda_{m-d} = \overline{\theta}.
$$

Let $\mathbb{C}[z_1,\ldots,z_m,w_1,\ldots,w_m]$ be the coordinate ring of \mathbb{C}^{2m} . Let $\sigma(C,\theta)$ = $\{\overline{b}_{i_j} \mid \lambda_j > 0\} \sqcup \{\overline{b}'_{i_j} \mid \lambda_j < 0\}, \text{ and } C(\theta) = \{z_{i_j} \mid \lambda_j > 0\} \sqcup \{w_{i_j} \mid \lambda_j < 0\}.$ We set

(3.3)
$$
\mathcal{I}_{\theta} := \left\langle \prod C(\theta) | C \text{ is a column basis of } \overline{\beta}^{\vee} \right\rangle,
$$

and

(3.4)
$$
\Sigma_{\theta} := \{ \overline{\sigma}(C, \theta) : C \text{ is a column basis of } \overline{\beta}^{\vee} \},
$$

where $\overline{\sigma}(C,\theta) = \{\overline{b}_{L,1},\ldots,\overline{b}_{L,m},\overline{b}'_{L,1},\cdots,\overline{b}'_{L,m}\}\setminus \sigma(C,\theta)$ is the complement of $\sigma(C,\theta)$ and corresponds to the maximal cones in Σ_{θ} . According to [10], Σ_{θ} is the fan of Lawrence toric variety $X(\Sigma_{\theta})$ corresponding to θ in the lattice \overline{N}_L . The ideal \mathcal{I}_{θ} is the irrelevant ideal of the fan Σ_{θ} . Then we have the Lawrence stacky fan $\Sigma_{\theta} = (N_L, \Sigma_{\theta}, \beta_L)$ introduced in [13].

Applying $\text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(-,\mathbb{C}^*)$ functor to (3.2), we get

(3.5) α^h : G → (C∗) ²m.

So G acts on \mathbb{C}^{2m} through α_h . From Section 2, $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}) = [(\mathbb{C}^{2m})]$ $V(\mathcal{I}_{\theta})/G$ whose coarse moduli space is the Lawrence toric variety $X(\Sigma_{\theta}) =$

 $(\mathbb{C}^{2m} \setminus V(\mathcal{I}_{\theta}))/G$. Let $Y \subset \mathbb{C}^{2m} \setminus V(\mathcal{I}_{\theta})$ be the subvariety defined by the ideal:

(3.6)

where $(\beta^{\vee})^* : DG(\beta)^* \to \mathbb{Z}^m$ is the dual map of β^{\vee} and $(\beta^{\vee})^*(x)_i$ is the *i*th component of the vector $(\beta^{\vee})^*(x)$. From [13], the hypertoric DM stack $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A})=[Y/G]$ whose coarse moduli space is the hypertoric variety $Y(\beta^{\vee}, \theta) = Y/G.$

Definition 3.1 [13]**.** The Lawrence toric DM stack is the toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ corresponding to the Lawrence stacky fan Σ_{θ} .

By [10], $X(\Sigma_{\theta})$ is semi-projective. So the Lawrence toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ is semi-projective by definition.

3.3. Comparison of inertia stacks

Next we compare the orbifold Chow ring of the hypertoric DM stack and the orbifold Chow ring of the Lawrence toric DM stack. First we compare the inertia stacks. From the map $\beta : \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$ which is given by vectors ${b_1,\ldots,b_m}$. Let Cone(β) be a partially-ordered finite set of cones generated by $\bar{b}_1,\ldots,\bar{b}_m$. The partial order is defined by: $\sigma \prec \tau$ if σ is a face of τ , and we have the minimum element $\hat{0}$ which is the cone consisting of the origin. Let Cone (\overline{N}) be the set of all convex polyhedral cones in the lattice \overline{N} . Then we have a map

$$
C: \mathrm{Cone}(\beta) \longrightarrow \mathrm{Cone}(\overline{N})
$$

such that for any $\sigma \in \text{Cone}(\beta)$, $C(\sigma)$ is the cone in \overline{N} . Then Δ_{β} := $(C, Cone(\beta))$ is a simplicial *multi-fan* in the sense of [9].

For the multi-fan Δ_{β} , let $Box(\Delta_{\beta})$ be the set of pairs (v, σ) , where σ is a cone in Δ_{β} , $v \in N$ such that $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i b_i$ for $0 < \alpha_i < 1$. (Note that σ is the minimal cone in Δ_{β} satisfying the above condition.) From [13], an element $(v, \sigma) \in Box(\Delta_{\beta})$ gives a component of the inertia stack $\mathcal{I}(\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}))$. Also consider the set $Box(\Sigma_{\theta})$ associated to the stacky fan Σ_{θ} , see Section 2.2 for its definition. An element $v \in Box(\Sigma_{\theta})$ gives a component of the inertia stack $\mathcal{I}(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}))$.

By the Lawrence lifting property, a vector b_i in N lifts to two vectors $\overline{b}_{\text{L},i}, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i}^{\prime}$ in \overline{N}_{L} . Let $\{\overline{b}_{\text{L},i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i_k}, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i_1}^{\prime}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i_k}^{\prime}\}$ be the Lawrence lifting of $\{\overline{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\overline{b}_{i_k}\}.$

Lemma 3.2. $\{\bar{b}_{i_1}, \ldots, \bar{b}_{i_k}\}$ generate a cone σ in Δ_{β} if and only if $\{\bar{b}_{L,i_1}, \ldots, \bar{b}_{L,i_k}\}$ $\overline{b}_{\text{L},i_k}, \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i_k}$ } generate a cone σ_{θ} in Σ_{θ} .

Proof. Suppose σ is a cone in Δ_{β} generated by ${\{\overline{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\overline{b}_{i_k}\}}$, it is contained in a top-dimensional cone τ . Assume that τ is generated by $\{\bar{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{i_k},\}$ $\overline{b}_{i_{k+1}}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{i_d}$. Let C be the complement $\{\overline{b}_1, \ldots, \overline{b}_m\} \setminus \tau$. Then C corresponds to a column basis of $\overline{\beta}^{\vee}$ in the map $\overline{\beta}^{\vee} : \mathbb{Z}^m \to \overline{\mathrm{DG}(\beta)}$. By the definition of Σ_{θ} in (3.4), C corresponds to a maximal cone τ_{θ} in Σ_{θ} which contains the rays generated by $\{\overline{b}_{L,i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{L,i_k}, \overline{b}'_{L,i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}'_{L,i_k}\}.$ Thus these rays generate a cone σ_{θ} in Σ_{θ} .

Conversely, suppose σ_{θ} is a cone in Σ_{θ} generated by $\{\bar{b}_{\text{L},i_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{\text{L},i_k},\}$ $\vec{b}'_{\text{L},i_1}, \ldots, \vec{b}'_{\text{L},i_k}$. Using the similar method above we prove that $\{\overline{b}_{i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{i_k}\}$ must be contained in a top-dimensional cone of Δ_{β} . So $\{\bar{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{i_k}\}\$ generate a cone σ in Δ_{β} .

Lemma 3.3. There is an one-to-one correspondence between the elements in $Box(\Sigma_{\theta})$ and the elements in $Box(\Delta_{\beta})$. Moreover, their degree shifting numbers coincide.

Proof. First the torsion elements in $Box(\Sigma_{\theta})$ and $Box(\Delta_{\beta})$ are both isomorphic to $\mu = \ker(\alpha) = \ker(\alpha_h)$ in (2.3) and (3.5). Let $(v, \sigma) \in \text{Box}(\Delta \beta)$ with $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i b_i$. Then v may be identified with an element (which we ambiguously denote by) $v \in G := \text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(DG(\beta), \mathbb{C}^*)$. Certainly v fixes a point in \mathbb{C}^m . Consider the map α in (2.3), put $\alpha(v)=(\alpha^1(v),\ldots,\alpha^m(v)).$ Then $\alpha^i(v) \neq 1$ if $\rho_i \subseteq \sigma$, and $\alpha^i(v) = 1$ otherwise. By Lemma 3.2, let $\{\overline{b}_{\text{L},i}, \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i} : i = 1,\ldots, |\sigma|\}$ be the Lawrence lifting of $\{\overline{b}_i\}_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma}$. Since the action of v on \mathbb{C}^{2m} is given by (v, v^{-1}) , v fixes a point in \mathbb{C}^{2m} and yields an element v_{θ} in Box(Σ_{θ}). From the map (3.5), let

$$
(3.7) \qquad \alpha_h(v_\theta) = (\alpha_h^1(v_\theta), \dots, \alpha_h^m(v_\theta), \alpha_h^{m+1}(v_\theta), \dots, \alpha_h^{2m}(v_\theta)).
$$

Then $\alpha_h^i(v_\theta) \neq 1$ and $\alpha_h^{i+m}(v_\theta) \neq 1$ if $\rho_i \subseteq \sigma$; $\alpha_h^i(v_\theta) = \alpha_h^{i+m}(v_\theta) = 1$ otherwise. So $\sigma_{\theta}(\overline{v}_{\theta}) = {\overline{b}_{\text{L},i}}, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i}^{i} : i = 1,\ldots, |\sigma|}$ is the minimal cone in Σ_{θ} containing \overline{v}_{θ} . Furthermore, $\overline{v}_{\theta} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i \overline{b}_{\mathrm{L},i} + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} (1 - \alpha_i) \overline{b}'_{\mathrm{L},i}$.

Conversely, given an element $v_{\theta} \in Box(\Sigma_{\theta})$, let $\sigma_{\theta}(\overline{v}_{\theta})$ be the minimal cone in Σ_{θ} containing \overline{v}_{θ} . Then from the action of G on \mathbb{C}^{2m} and (3.7), we have $\alpha_h^i(v_\theta) = (\alpha_h^{i+m}(v_\theta))^{-1}$. If $\alpha_h^i(v_\theta) \neq 1$, then $\alpha_h^{i+m}(v_\theta) \neq 1$, which means that $\overline{b}_{\text{L},i}, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i+m} \in \sigma_{\theta}(\overline{v}_{\theta})$. The cone $\sigma_{\theta}(\overline{v}_{\theta})$ is the one in Σ_{θ} containing $\overline{b}_{\text{L},i}, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i+m}$ satisfying this condition. Then $\overline{v}_{\theta} = \sum_i (\alpha_i \overline{b}_{\text{L},i} + (1 - \alpha_i) \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i}).$ By Lemma 3.2, $\sigma_{\theta}(\overline{v}_{\theta})$ is the Lawrence lifting of a cone σ generated by

the $\{b_i\}$ s in Δ_{β} . Let $v = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i b_i$. So it also determines an element $(v, \sigma) \in \text{Box}(\Delta_{\beta}).$ \Box

For $(v_1, \sigma_1), (v_2, \sigma_2), (v_3, \sigma_3) \in \text{Box}(\Delta_{\beta}),$ let $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$ be the minimal cone containing $\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3$ in Δ_{β} such that $\overline{v}_1 + \overline{v}_2 + \overline{v}_3 = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)}$ $a_i\overline{b}_i$ and $a_i = 1, 2$. Let $v_{\theta,1}, v_{\theta,2}, v_{\theta,3}$ be the corresponding elements in $\text{Box}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ and $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ the minimal cone containing $\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3}$ in Σ_{θ} . Then by Lemmas 3.2 and 3.3, $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ is the Lawrence lifting of $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$. Suppose that σ is generated by $\{\overline{b}_{i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{i_s}\}\,$ then $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ is generated by $\{\overline{b}_{\text{L},i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}_{\text{L},i_s}, \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i_1}, \ldots, \overline{b}'_{\text{L},i_s}\},\$ the Lawrence lifting of $\{\bar{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{i_s}\}$. Let $\{\bar{b}_{j_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{j_{m-l-s}}\}$ be the rays not in $\sigma \cup \text{link}(\sigma)$, we have the Lawrence lifting $\{\bar{b}_{\text{L},j_1}, \ldots, \bar{b}_{\text{L},j_{m-l-s}}, \bar{b}'_{\text{L},j_1}, \ldots, \bar{b}_{\text{L},j_{m-l-s}}\}$ $\overline{b}'_{\mathrm{L},j_{m-l-s}}$. Then from the definition of Lawrence fan Σ_{θ} in (3.4), we have the following lemma.

Lemma 3.4. There exist $m - l - s$ vectors in $\{\bar{b}_{\text{L},j_1},\ldots,\bar{b}_{\text{L},j_{m-l-s}},\bar{b}'_{\text{L},j_1},\ldots,$ $\overline{b}'_{\text{L},j_{m-l-s}}\}$ such that the rays they generate plus the rays in $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1},\overline{v}_{\theta,2},\overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ generate a cone σ_{θ} in Σ_{θ} .

Proposition 3.5. The stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta})$ is also a Lawrence toric DM stack.

Proof. For simplicity, put $\sigma := \sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$. Suppose there are l rays in the link(σ). Then by Lemma 3.2 there are 2l rays in link(σ), the Lawrence lifting of link(σ). Let $s := |\sigma|$, then $2s + m - l - s = |\sigma_{\theta}|$. Applying Gale dual to the diagrams:

For the generic element θ , from the map φ_2 in (3.9), θ induces $\theta \in DG(\beta)$, and from the isomorphism φ_1 in (3.8), $\theta = \theta(\sigma) \in DG(\beta(\sigma))$. So we a quotient stacky hyperplane arrangement $\mathcal{A}(\sigma)=(N(\sigma), \beta(\sigma), \theta(\sigma))$. From the above diagrams, we see that the quotient fan $\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta}$ in $\overline{N}_{\text{L}}(\sigma_{\theta})$ also comes from a Lawrence construction of the map $\beta(\sigma)^{\vee} : \mathbb{Z}^l \to DG(\beta(\sigma))$. Let $X(\sigma) = \mathbb{C}^{2l} \setminus V(\mathcal{I}_{\theta(\sigma)})$, where $\mathcal{I}_{\theta(\sigma)}$ is the irrelevant ideal of the quotient fan $\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta}$. Let $G(\sigma) = \text{Hom}_{\mathbb{Z}}(\text{DG}(\beta(\sigma)), \mathbb{C}^*)$. The stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta}) =$ $[X(\sigma)/G(\sigma)]$ is a Lawrence toric Deligne–Mumford stack. \square

Corollary 3.6. $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)))$ is the hypertoric DM stack associated to the quotient Lawrence toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta}).$

Proof. $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)))$ is constructed in [13] as a quotient stack $\left[Y(\sigma)\right]$ $G(\sigma)$, where $Y(\sigma) \subset X(\sigma)$ is defined by $I_{\beta(\sigma)}$, which is the ideal in (3.6) corresponding to the map $\beta(\sigma)^\vee$ in (3.8). So the stack $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)))$ is the associated hypertoric DM stack in the Lawrence toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\mathbf{\Sigma}_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta}).$

Remark 3.7. For any $v_{\theta} \in \text{Box}(\Sigma_{\theta})$, let v_{θ}^{-1} be its inverse. We have the quotient Lawrence toric stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta})$. Let (v, σ) be the corresponding element in $Box(\Delta_{\beta})$, then

$$
\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma(\overline{v}, \overline{v}^{-1}, 1))) \cong \mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma)).
$$

By Proposition 3.5 and Corollary 3.6, the twisted sector $\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}(\sigma))$ is the associated hypertoric DM stack of the Lawrence toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta})$.

Remark 3.8. From Lemma 3.4, the cone σ_{θ} is not the minimal cone $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ containing $\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3}$ in Σ_{θ} . So $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3}))$ is not a Lawrence toric DM stack. But from the construction of Lawrence toric DM stack, the quotient stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3}))$ is homotopy equivalent to the quotient stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta}/\sigma_{\theta})$. Since we do not need this to compare the orbifold Chow ring, we omit the details.

3.4. Comparison of orbifold Chow rings

Recall that $N_L = N_L \oplus N_{L,\text{tor}}$, where $N_{L,\text{tor}}$ is the torsion subgroup of N_L . Let $N_{\Sigma_{\theta}} = N_{\text{L,tor}} \oplus |\Sigma_{\theta}|$. By Theorem 1.1, we have

Proposition 3.9. The orbifold Chow ring $A^*_{orb}(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_\theta))$ of the Lawrence toric DM stack $\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ is isomorphic to the ring

(3.12)
$$
\frac{\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma_{\theta}}]}{\left\{\sum_{i=1}^{m}e(b_{\mathrm{L},i})y^{b_{\mathrm{L},i}}+\sum_{i=1}^{m}e(b'_{\mathrm{L},i})y^{b'_{\mathrm{L},i}} : e \in N_{\mathrm{L}}^{\star}\right\}}.
$$

Recall in [13] that for any $c \in N$, there is a cone $\sigma \in \Delta_{\beta}$ such that $\bar{c} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i \bar{b}_i$ where $\alpha_i > 0$ are rational numbers. Let $N^{\Delta_{\beta}}$ denote all the pairs (c, σ) . Then $N^{\Delta_{\beta}}$ gives rise a group ring

$$
\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}] = \bigoplus_{(c,\sigma) \in N^{\Delta_{\beta}}} \mathbb{Q} \cdot y^{(c,\sigma)},
$$

where y is a formal variable. For any $(c, \sigma) \in N^{\Delta_{\beta}}$, there exists a unique element $(v, \tau) \in \text{Box}(\Delta_{\beta})$ such that $\tau \subseteq \sigma$ and $c = v + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} m_i b_i$, where m_i are non-negative integers. We call (v, τ) the fractional part of (v, σ) . We define the *ceiling function* for fans. For (c, σ) , define the ceiling function $[c]_{\sigma}$ by $[c]_{\sigma} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \tau} b_i + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} m_i b_i$. Note that if $\overline{v} = 0$, $[c]_{\sigma} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} m_i b_i$. For two pairs (c_1, σ_1) , (c_2, σ_2) , if $\sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2$ is a cone in Δ_{β} , define $\epsilon(c_1, c_2) :=$ $[c_1]_{\sigma_1} + [c_2]_{\sigma_2} - [c_1 + c_2]_{\sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2}$. Let $\sigma_{\epsilon} \subseteq \sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2$ be the minimal cone in Δ_{β} containing $\epsilon(c_1, c_2)$ such that $(\epsilon(c_1, c_2), \sigma_{\epsilon}) \in N^{\Delta_{\beta}}$. We define the grading on $\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]$ as follows. For any (c, σ) , write $c = v + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} m_i b_i$, then $deg(y^{(c,\sigma)}) = |\tau| + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} m_i$, where $|\tau|$ is the dimension of τ . By abuse of notation, we write $y^{(b_i, \overline{\rho_i})}$ as y^{b_i} . The multiplication is defined by

(3.13)
\n
$$
y^{(c_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(c_2,\sigma_2)} := \begin{cases} (-1)^{|\sigma_{\epsilon}|} y^{(c_1+c_2+\epsilon(c_1,c_2),\sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2)} & \text{if } \sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2 \text{ is a cone in } \Delta_{\beta}, \\ 0 & \text{otherwise.} \end{cases}
$$

From the property of ceiling function, we check that the multiplication is commutative and associative. So $\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]$ is a unital associative commutative ring. In [13], it is shown that

(3.14)
$$
A_{\text{orb}}^*(\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A})) \cong \frac{\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]}{\left\{\sum_{i=1}^m e(b_i)y^{b_i} : e \in N^{\star}\right\}}.
$$

Consider the map $\beta : \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$ which is given by the vectors $\{b_1, \ldots, b_m\}.$ We take $\{1,\ldots,m\}$ as the vertex set of the matroid complex M_{β} , defined from β by requiring that $F \in M_\beta$ iff the vectors $\{b_i\}_{i \in F}$ are linearly independent in \overline{N} . A face $F \in M_\beta$ corresponds to a cone in Δ_β generated by ${b_i}_{i \in F}$. By [16], the "Stanley–Reisner" ring of the matroid M_β is

$$
\mathbb{Q}[M_{\beta}]=\frac{\mathbb{Q}[y^{b_1},\ldots,y^{b_m}]}{I_{M_{\beta}}},
$$

where $I_{M_{\beta}}$ is the matroid ideal generated by the set of square-free monomials

$$
\{y^{b_{i_1}}\cdots y^{b_{i_k}}|\overline{b}_{i_1},\ldots,\overline{b}_{i_k}\text{ linearly dependent in }\overline{N}\}.
$$

It is proved in [13] that,

$$
\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}] \cong \bigoplus_{(v,\sigma) \in \text{Box}(\Delta_{\beta})} y^{(v,\sigma)} \cdot \mathbb{Q}[M_{\beta}].
$$

For any $(v_1, \sigma_1), (v_2, \sigma_2) \in Box(\Delta_{\beta})$, let (v_3, σ_3) be the unique element in Box(Δ_{β}) such that $v_1 + v_2 + v_3 \equiv 0$ in the local group given by $\sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2$, where $\equiv 0$ means that there exists a cone $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$ in Δ_{β} such that $\overline{v}_1 + \overline{v}_2 + \overline{v}_3 = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)} a_i \overline{b}_i$, where $a_i = 1$ or 2. Let $\overline{v}_1 = \sum_{\rho_j \subseteq \sigma_1} \alpha_j^1 \overline{b}_j$, $\overline{v}_2 = \sum_{\rho_j \subseteq \sigma_2} \alpha_j^2 \overline{b}_j$, $\overline{v}_3 = \sum_{\rho_j \subseteq \sigma_3} \alpha_j^3 \overline{b}_j$ with $0 < \alpha_j^1, \alpha_j^2, \alpha_j^3 < 1$. Let *I* be the set of i such that $a_i = 1$ and $\alpha_j^1, \alpha_j^2, \alpha_j^3$ exist, J the set of j such that ρ_j belongs to $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$ but not σ_3 . If $(v, \sigma) \in Box(\Delta_{\beta})$, let (\check{v}, σ) be the inverse of (v, σ) . Except torsion elements, equivalently, if $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i b_i$ for $0 < \alpha_i < 1$, then $\tilde{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} (1 - \alpha_i) \overline{b}_i$. By abuse of notation, we write $y^{(b_i, \rho_i)}$ as y^{b_i} . We have $v_1 + v_2 = \check{v}_3 + \sum_{a_i=2} b_i + \sum_{j \in J} b_j$. From (3.13), [13, Lemma 5.11] and [13, Lemma 5.12], if $\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2 \neq 0$, we have

$$
\lceil v_1 \rceil_{\sigma_1} + \lceil v_2 \rceil_{\sigma_2} - \lceil v_1 + v_2 \rceil_{\sigma_1 \cup \sigma_2} = \left\{ \begin{array}{ll} \sum_{i \in I} b_i + \sum_{j \in J} b_j & \text{if } \overline{v}_1 \neq \overline{v}_2, \\ \sum_{j \in J} b_j & \text{if } \overline{v}_1 = \overline{v}_2. \end{array} \right.
$$

So it is easy to check that the multiplication $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$ can be written as

(3.15)
\n
$$
\begin{cases}\n(-1)^{|I|+|J|}y^{(\tilde{v}_3,\sigma_3)} \cdot \prod_{a_i=2} y^{b_i} \\
\prod_{i \in I} y^{b_i} \cdot \prod_{j \in J} y^{2b_j} & \text{if } \overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2 \in \sigma \text{ for } \sigma \in \Delta_{\beta} \text{ and } \overline{v}_1 \neq \overline{v}_2, \\
(-1)^{|J|} \prod_{j \in J} y^{2b_j} & \text{if } \overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2 \in \sigma \text{ for } \sigma \in \Delta_{\beta} \text{ and } \overline{v}_1 = \overline{\tilde{v}}_2, \\
0 & \text{otherwise.} \n\end{cases}
$$

The following is the main result of this section.

Theorem 3.10. There is an isomorphism of orbifold Chow rings A_{orb}^* $(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta})) \cong A_{\mathrm{orb}}^*(\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A})).$

Proof. The ring $\mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma_{\theta}}]$ is generated by $\{y^{b_{\mathrm{L},i}}, y^{b'_{\mathrm{L},i}} : i = 1,\ldots,m\}$ and $y^{v_{\theta}}$ for $v_{\theta} \in \text{Box}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ by the definition. By Lemma 3.3, define a morphism

$$
\phi : \mathbb{Q}[N_{\Sigma_{\theta}}] \to \mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]
$$

by $y^{b_{\text{L},i}} \mapsto y^{b_i}, y^{b'_{\text{L},i}} \mapsto -y^{b_i}$ and $y^{v_\theta} \mapsto y^{(v,\sigma)}$. By [10], the ideal \mathcal{I}_θ goes to the ideal I_{M_β} and the relation $\{\sum_{i=1}^m e(b_{\text{L},i})y^{b_{\text{L},i}} + \sum_{i=1}^m e(b'_{\text{L},i})y^{b'_{\text{L},i}} : e \in N_{\text{L}}^\star\}$ goes to the relation $\{\sum_{i=1}^m e(b_i)y^{b_i} : e \in N^*\}$. Thus the two rings are isomorphic as modules.

It remains to check the multiplications. For any $y^{v_{\theta}}$ and $y^{b_{L,i}}$, or $y^{b'_{L,i}}$, let $y^{(v,\sigma)}$ be the corresponding element in $\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]$. By the property of v_{θ} and Lemma 3.3, the minimal cone in Σ_{θ} containing $\overline{v}_{\theta}, \overline{b}_{\mathrm{L},i}$ must contains $\overline{b}'_{L,i}$. By Lemma 3.2, there is a cone in Δ_{β} containing $\overline{v}, \overline{b}_i$. In this way, $y^{v_{\theta}} \cdot y^{b_{\text{L},i}}$ goes to $y^{(v,\sigma)} \cdot y^{b_i}$ and $y^{v_\theta} \cdot y^{b'_{L,i}}$ goes to $-y^{(v,\sigma)} \cdot y^{b_i}$. If there is no cone in Σ_{θ} containing $\overline{v}_{\theta}, \overline{b}_{\mathrm{L},i}, \overline{b}'_{\mathrm{L},i}$, then by Lemma 3.2 there is no cone in Δ_{β} containing $\overline{v}, \overline{b}_i$. So $y^{v_\theta} \cdot y^{b_{\text{L},i}} = 0$ goes to $y^{(v,\sigma)} \cdot y^{b_i} = 0$ and $y^{v_\theta} \cdot y^{b'_{\text{L},i}} = 0$ goes to $-y^{(v,\sigma)} \cdot y^{b_i} = 0$.

For any $y^{v_{\theta,1}}, y^{v_{\theta,2}},$ let $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)}, y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$ be the corresponding elements in $\mathbb{Q}[\Delta_{\beta}]$. If there is no cone in Σ_{θ} containing $\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}$, then by Lemmas 3.2 and 3.3, there is no cone in Δ_{β} containing $\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2$. So $y^{v_{\theta,1}} \cdot y^{v_{\theta,2}} = 0$ goes to $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)} = 0$. Suppose there is a cone containing $\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}$, let $v_{\theta,3} \in \text{Box}(\Sigma_{\theta})$ such that $v_{\theta,1} + v_{\theta,2} + v_{\theta,3} \equiv 0$. Let $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ be the minimal cone containing $\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3}$ in Σ_{θ} . Then by Lemmas 3.2 and 3.3, $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ is the Lawrence lifting of $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$ for $(v_1, \sigma_1), (v_2, \sigma_2), (v_3, \sigma_3) \in \text{Box}(\Delta_{\beta}).$ So we may write $\overline{v}_{\theta,1} + \overline{v}_{\theta,2} + \overline{v}_{\theta,3} =$ $\sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)} a_i \overline{b}_{\mathrm{L},i} + \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)} a'_i \overline{b}'_{\mathrm{L},i}$. The corresponding $\overline{v}_1 + \overline{v}_2 + \overline{v}_3$ $=\sum_{\rho_i\subseteq \sigma(\overline{v}_1,\overline{v}_2,\overline{v}_3)} a_ib_i$. Let (\check{v},σ) be the inverse of (v,σ) in $Box(\Delta_{\beta}),$ i.e., if v is nontorsion and $\overline{v} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma} \alpha_i \overline{b}_i$ for $0 < \alpha_i < 1$, then $\check{\overline{v}} = \sum_{\rho_i \subseteq \sigma}$ $(1 - \alpha_i)\overline{b}_i$. The $\check{\nu}_{\theta}$ is defined similarly in Box(Σ_{θ}). The notation J represents the set of j such that ρ_j belongs to $\sigma(\overline{v}_1, \overline{v}_2, \overline{v}_3)$ but not σ_3 , the corresponding $\rho_{L,j}, \rho'_{L,j}$ belong to $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1}, \overline{v}_{\theta,2}, \overline{v}_{\theta,3})$ but not $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,3})$.

If some $\overline{v}_{\theta,i} = 0$ which means that $v_{\theta,i}$ is a torsion. Then from Lemma 3.3 the corresponding v is also a torsion element. In this case, we know that the orbifold cup product $y^{v_{\theta,1}} \cdot y^{v_{\theta,2}}$ is the usual product, and under the map ϕ , is equal to $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$.

If $\overline{v}_{\theta,1} = \overline{\tilde{v}}_{\theta,2}$, then $\overline{v}_{\theta,3} = 0$ and the obstruction bundle over the corresponding 3-twisted sector is zero. The set J is the set j such that ρ_i belongs to $\sigma(\overline{v}_{\theta,1})$. So from [3], we have

$$
y^{v_{\theta,1}} \cdot y^{v_{\theta,2}} = \prod_{j \in J} y^{b_{\text{L},j}} \cdot y^{b'_{\text{L},j}}.
$$

Under the map ϕ , we see that $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$ is equal to the second line in the product (3.15).

If $\overline{v}_{\theta,1} \neq \check{\overline{v}}_{\theta,2}$, then $\overline{v}_{\theta,3} \neq 0$ and the obstruction bundle is given by Proposition 2.10. If all $\alpha_j^1, \alpha_j^2, \alpha_j^3$ exist, the coefficients a_i and a'_i satisfy that if $a_i = 1$ then $a'_i = 2$, and if $a_i = 2$ then $a'_i = 1$. So from [3],

$$
y^{v_{\theta,1}} \cdot y^{v_{\theta,2}} = y^{\check{v}_{\theta,3}} \cdot \prod_{a_i=2} y^{b_{\text{L},i}} \cdot \prod_{i \in I} y^{b'_{\text{L},i}} \cdot \prod_{j \in J} y^{b_{\text{L},j}} \cdot y^{b'_{\text{L},j}}.
$$

Under the map ϕ , we see that $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$ is equal to the first line in the product (3.15). By Lemma 3.3, the box elements have the same orbifold degrees. By Corollary 3.6 and the definition of orbifold cup product in (2.7), the products $y^{v_{\theta,1}} \cdot y^{v_{\theta,2}}$ and $y^{(v_1,\sigma_1)} \cdot y^{(v_2,\sigma_2)}$ have the same degrees in both Chow rings. So ϕ induces a ring isomorphism $A_{\text{orb}}^*(\mathcal{X}(\Sigma_{\theta})) \cong$ $A^*_{\text{orb}}(\mathcal{M}(\mathcal{A}))$.

Remark 3.11. The presentation (3.14) of orbifold Chow ring only depends on the matroid complex corresponding to the map $\beta : \mathbb{Z}^m \to N$, not θ . Note that the presentation (3.12) depends on the fan Σ_{θ} . We could not see explicitly from this presentation that the ring is independent to the choice of generic elements θ .
